CASE

A 28-year-old female with no comorbidities came for an antenatal ultrasound scan at 37 weeks of pregnancy for assessment of amniotic fluid. The fetal biometry was

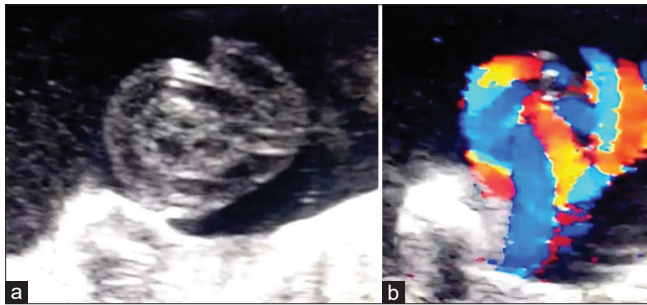


Figure 1: Gray-scale ultrasound (a) and color Doppler (b) transverse section of an umbilical cord in a 28-years-old female who came for an antenatal ultrasound scan at 37 weeks of pregnancy for assessment of amniotic fluid
